

#### THE MONTH OF BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

The month of May is traditionally known as the Month of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Catholics the world over are invited and advised to pray the Rosary daily. Now this is not easy due to the busy schedule and other unknown hindrances. Therefore we need to put in more effort and make time for this rosary season. We need to use every available opportunity and time slot to be with Mary in her prayer. Praying the Rosary is not, nor should not be, limited in either duration or fervor to one set period, or place. The Rosary should be a part of every Catholics prayer life and spiritual development. Rosary is more efficacious when said in a group. Mandatory recitation of the Rosary in the family is wonderful. This family prayer requires a bit of sacrifice in order to fit in each other's time schedule. You can cut down on some activities and switch off the TV.

We had started the practice of praying the Rosary every Sunday half hour before the beginning of the Sunday Mass. When the pandemic hit us, many liturgical activities came to a standstill including the recitation before the Sunday Mass.

Praying the Rosary, in addition to giving respect and gratitude to the Blessed Virgin, it helped to put us in the mood of prayer.

We can resume this practice of praying the Rosary before Sunday Mass starting with this Month of May. Most of the time we join to pray the Rosary as a family in our homes, the Sunday Rosary prayer will help us to pray the Rosary together as a parish family.

We had also started the generous act of donating a Rosary to the anonymous parish friend, who needs that beautiful Rosary you have at home or that Rosary you also admired on your pilgrimage. All Rosaries that were donated last year, found a home. I am asking you again to consider donating more rosaries so that no one may go without. This is a very crucial time to keep a rosary around us so much so that whenever you come across a community of faith praying, you simply join in. Encourage and remind all your friends using all means possible to pray the Rosary.

How to pray the Rosary, The ideal is to have the whole family recite at least five decades of the Rosary daily. We need to say the Rosary slowly enough to make its recitation devout and reverent. We are to reflect on the mystery and then concentrate on the meaning of the prayers as we say them to avoid distractions. Besides saying the Rosary with others in the family, let us make a habit of reciting the Rosary during our journey to the workplace and during our exercises. If we do so, we shall experience for ourselves the truth of these words: "Meditating on the mysteries of the most holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, may we imitate what they contain and obtain what they promise."

Every single prayer in The Rosary is fully rooted in the Bible and all the mysteries in each decade help us to meditate deeply about the life of Jesus Christ and Mary.

I wish you a fruitful Month of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

The Director of Facilities Management oversees all facilities maintenance and operations for the Central Administrative Office (Pastoral Center) for the Catholic Diocese of Richmond. General oversight includes office administration, maintenance, capital projects, planning and project management, purchasing, and the health, safety and security of employees in the workplace. Maintenance includes, but is not limited to, building structures, permanent interiors and exteriors, ground maintenance and all building systems (mechanical, electrical, fire/life safety, plumbing and waste management, etc.). # May is a great time to begin new ways of honoring Mary in our homes. Here are a few ideas.

There is an ancient tradition in the Church of creating Marian Gardens.

Many of us have statues of Mary in our yards, but did you know that there are many beautiful plants that are symbolic to the life of Mary? For example, ferns are symbolic of Mary's hair and pansies (with their three petals) are a reminder of the Trinity and sometimes referred to as "Our Lady's Delight." Their are many online sources for such gardens,

and it is a fun way to include the entire family.

Have a May crowning. Many parishes of course have a May crowning, but if you have a statue of Mary in your home or yard, have a May crowning. It doesn't take much talent to create a small crown (I know this from experience!) with small flowers purchased from a craft store. If you have children, include them! Crown Mary, perhaps sing a Marian hymn or pray the Hail Mary of Regina Caeli together.

Pray the Rosary. Many a good intention has been made to pray the Rosary daily, only to be forgotten in our

busy lives. Praying the Rosary is a most powerful prayer (*Give me an army saying the Rosary and I will conquer the world*, said Blessed Pope Pius IX), and Mary herself (at Fatima) promised peace if we would only pray the Rosary daily with great devotion. If you aren't sure how to pray the Rosary, it is easy to learn. Again, involve your children if you have any. And if an entire Rosary is too much for some children (I know it was for a couple of mine!), pray a decade with them before bedtime, and then finish the Rosary on your own. If you have kids, make sure they have child-friendly Rosaries.

St. John Paul II credited Mary with saving his life when he was shot in St. Peter's Square. He had a great devotion to Our Lady of Fatima, and wrote a beautiful prayer to her. Perhaps your May devotion to Mary could be praying this daily. (SEE RIGHT)


