Month of the Holy Family– Beginning of Lent



The month of February is traditionally dedicated to the Holy Family. Between the events which marked Christmas and the beginning of Christ's public life the Church has seen fit to recall the example of the Holy Family for the emulation of the Christian family.

The Feast of the **Presentation** (February

2) or **Candlemas** forms a fitting transition from Christmas to Easter. The small Christ-Child is still in His Mother's arms, but already she is offering Him in sacrifice. February 21, Shrove Tuesday, will find us preparing for **Ash Wednesday**. The middle of the month will find us on **Ash Wednesday** accepting the ashes that remind us of our mortality and our need for penance. The saints that we will focus on this month and try to imitate are **St. Blaise** (February 3), **St. Jerome Emiliani** and **St. Josephine Bakhita** (February 8), **St. Scholastica** (February 10), **Our Lady of Lourdes** (February 11), **Sts. Cyril and Methodius** (February 14), **Seven Founders of the Orders of Servites** (February 17), **St. Peter Damian** (February 21), and **St. Polycarp** (February 23). The feast of **St. Agatha** (February 5) is superseded by the Sunday Liturgy. The feast of the Chair of St. Peter (February 22) is superseded by the liturgy for Ash Wednesday.

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LENTEN MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR.

My dear brothers and sisters, we thank God for bringing us yet to another season of Lent that starts in this month of February. Whenever we talk about lent the three pillars of Lent that is Prayer, Fasting and almsgiving come to our mind. We pray to beg from God the force to convert and to believe the Gospel. Conversion helps us to fight evil as we struggle to renew our life in the course of the Lenten season.

Fasting helps us to practice self-denial. Evil cannot be won without self-denial or by giving up one's likings. Self-Denial brings some suffering but it is a good thing because God does not want to see anybody in need. Our self-denial helps us to give up something that we can give to the neighbor in need.

Our love and concern for the neighbor in need pleases God. Hence there is a link between fasting and almsgiving. You will deprive yourself of something, and your self-denial will thus satisfy somebody else's hunger. He will pray to the Lord for you. If this is the way you fast, God will be pleased with your sacrifice.

Fasting as a penance for our sins is beneficial to ourselves but is also intended to benefit other people especially for the purposes of improving their livelihood. Doing good to others is a spiritual discipline that purifies us, creates a good example for the little ones in faith to emulate, increases the flow of love, and overcomes our selfishness without anyone getting hurt. Let us take this spiritual discipline of fasting seriously during this time of Lent for the salvation of our souls and for the wellbeing of God's people.

A great Pope of the early Church, St. Leo the Great, said in one of his homilies: "We order you to fast and we do not just remind you to abstain from meat, but also of the need to do works of mercy. In this way what you spare on ordinary expenses is changed into food for the poor.

MENSAJE DE CUARESMA DEL PÁRROCO.

Mis queridos hermanos y hermanas, damos gracias a Dios por traernos a otra temporada de Cuaresma que comienza en este mes de febrero. Siempre que hablamos de Cuaresma, los tres pilares de la Cuaresma que son la oración, el ayuno y la limosna vienen a nuestra mente. Oramos para rogar a Dios la fuerza para convertirnos y creer en el Evangelio. La conversión nos ayuda a combatir el mal mientras luchamos por renovar nuestra vida en el transcurso de la temporada de cuaresma.

El ayuno nos ayuda a practicar la abnegación. No se puede ganar el mal sin abnegación o renunciando a los gustos. La abnegación trae algo de sufrimiento pero es algo bueno porque Dios no quiere ver a nadie en necesidad. Nuestra abnegación nos ayuda a renunciar a algo que podemos dar al prójimo que lo necesita.

Nuestro amor y preocupación por el prójimo en necesidad agrada a Dios. Por lo tanto, existe un vínculo entre el ayuno y la limosna. Te privarás de algo y tu abnegación satisfará así el hambre de otra persona. Él orará al Señor por ti. Si esta es la forma en que ayuna, Dios estará complacido con su sacrificio.

El ayuno como penitencia por nuestros pecados es beneficioso para nosotros, pero también tiene la intención de beneficiar a otras personas, especialmente con el fin de mejorar su sustento. Hacer el bien a los demás es una disciplina espiritual que nos purifica, crea un buen ejemplo a imitar para los pequeños en la fe, aumenta el flujo del amor y vence nuestro egoísmo sin que nadie salga lastimado. Tomemos en serio esta disciplina espiritual del ayuno durante este tiempo de Cuaresma para la salvación de nuestras almas y el bienestar del pueblo de Dios.

Un gran Papa de la Iglesia primitiva, San León Magno, dijo en una de sus homilías: "Os ordenamos ayunar y os recordamos no sólo que os abstengáis de comer, sino también la necesidad de hacer obras de misericordia. De esta manera, lo que ahorras en los gastos ordinarios se convierte en alimento para los pobres.



From Feast to Fast

Though the shortest month of the year, February is rich in Liturgical activity. It contains a feast (Presentation of our Lord) that bridges two other seasons (Christmas and Easter)! In addition, the faithful may receive in February three of the four major public sacramentals that the Church confers during the liturgical year: blessed candles and the blessing of throats and blessed ashes.



The Solemnity of the [Presentation of the Lord](#) on February 2nd harkens back to the Christmas mystery of Light except that now, Christ, the helpless babe, is “the Light of Revelation to the Gentiles who will save his people from their sins.” Candles, symbolizing Christ our Light, will be carried in procession this day, as will be the Paschal candle during the Easter Vigil Liturgy.

"The Light of Revelation" shines more brightly with each successive Sunday of Ordinary Time, until its magnificence—exposing our sinfulness and need for conversion—propels us into the penitential Season of Lent. We prepare to accept the cross of blessed ashes on Ash Wednesday (February 22) and plunge ourselves into anticipating the major exercises of Lent—fasting, prayer, almsgiving—laying our thoughts and prayers on the heart of our Mother Mary. She, who offered her Son in the temple and on the Cross, will teach us how to deny ourselves, take up our cross daily, and follow after her Son.


